

Guidelines on Application for Dormitory Accommodation to I-Shou University

I. Legal Basis:

The Guidelines on Application for Dormitory Accommodation to I-Shou University (hereinafter referred to as the “Guidelines”) are enacted as per Article 5 of the Regulations for Student Dormitory Management at I-Shou University to take care of students with disabilities or those who need living on campus due to special reasons.

II. Priority Application Qualifications:

Students satisfying any of the following requirements may file a priority application for dormitory accommodation:

1. having a valid Disability Card:

As for applicants with mental disorder, the Counseling and Guidance Section will file an extraordinary petition.

2. having a catastrophic illness:

Such applicants shall submit a valid Catastrophic Illness Card, and a Certificate of Diagnosis issued by a regional hospital or medical center in the year in which an application is filed.

3. coming from a low-income family as accredited by the government:

Such applicants shall submit a valid certificate of low-income status.

4. overseas compatriot students, international students, and children of R.O.C. diplomats

5. students who are disaster victims from severely affected areas.

6. students who need living on campus due to dormitory affairs, student club operation or service education:

a. cadres of the Student Dormitory Autonomy Association;

b. cadres for service education who have been ranked “Excellent;”

c. dormitory residents having won the dormitory cleanliness competition; or

d. students with remarkable sports achievements.

III. In any of the following situations, students are recommended not to apply for dormitory accommodation, and those who have moved in to move out without delay:

1. having been diagnosed by a physician as having a contagious illness, leading to difficulties in living in a group (as specified by the healthcare authorities);

2. having been diagnosed by a physician as having a tendency for self-harm, harm to others or violence, leading to possible adverse effects on fellow residents (as diagnosed by the

Department of Psychiatry of a regional hospital or medical center);

3. having been diagnosed by a physician as having mental disorder, leading to difficulties in living in a group (students are recommended not to apply for dormitory accommodation, and those who have moved in to move out without delay); or
4. having violated any provisions of the Regulations for Student Rewards and Punishments at I-Shou University and been recommended not to continue residence in the dormitory as decided by the Student Affairs Council.

IV. The Guidelines become effective on the day of promulgation after adopted by the Office Affairs Council of Student Affairs and ratified by the President. The same procedure applies to any amendment to the Guidelines.

Note: In the event of any disputes or misunderstanding as to the interpretation of the language or terms of these Guidelines, the Chinese language version shall prevail.
